Everybody Goes Haywire At Rock 'n' Roll Premiere

After "rocking 'n' rolling" outside the Paramount Theatre, Broadway and 43d st., as early as 4 a. m., today thousands of screaming teenagers who got in to see a "rock

'n' roll" movie and stage bill staged a show of their own.

They danced in the aisles for the premiere of "Don't Knock the Rock," starring

Alan Freed and Alan Dale, a couple of gents whose "Elvis" knack of "rocking 'em" necessitated a command performance by 125 cops. Freed is a wellknown disc jockey. STAND ON SEATS They stood on their seats, slapped and stomped and surged toward the stage during the "rock 'n' roll" stage show that also featured Freed. Carol McGrath, 17, of 172 W. 34th st., and Josephine Torrea, 19, of 58 Wyckoff st., both Brooklyn, suffered leg injuries

when they "rocked" instead of "rolled" with 5,000 teenagers outside the theatre, at 8 a. m. They were pushed against fire hydrants and taken to St. Clare's Hospital.

Barefoot girls ran up ans down the aisles as ushers tried vainly to quell the excitement. Many couples were oblivious of the commotion and "necked" throughout the show. The glass of the theatre ticket window was broken. So was the

glass panel in the door of Andy's Food Shop, around the corner at 210 W. 43d st. Many of the youngsters wore "I Love Elvis" and "Love Me Tender" badges.

Sandwiches, shoes, scarves and other articles of clothing were scattered in front of the theatre, having been lost by the

youngsters. OPENING DELAYED The film was scheduled to

vehicular traffic was permitted The line stretched from the theatre along 43d st., to 8th

ave. and up 8th ave. to 44th st. Harried cops are due for a one-week performance with the "rock n' rollers." The show ends Thursday.
