Fats Domino seems destined to take his place among the modern music greats. Not since the early days of Satchmo, Kid Ory, and Leadbelly Morton has a New Orleans musician so completely captured the imagination of the public.

Fats has scored a truly staggering success in every facet of show business. As a recording artist, he has sold over ten million records in the past three years alone, including his sensational renditions of "My Blue Heaven," "When My Dreamboat Comes Home," and "Blueberry Hill" on Imperial Records.

He has played many of the country's leading night clubs and theatres, attracting SRO business everywhere. When he headlined the rock 'n roll show at the Brooklyn Paramount, the gross was an unprecedented \$220,000.

An entertainer like Fats doesn't just "happen." His talent is the result of a lifetime of hard work and application. He was born Antoine Domino on February 26, 1928, in New Orleans. Although he was the only one of nine children to show an interest in music, the family was not an unmusical one. His father was a violinist and his uncle, Harry Verett, had played with such famous jazz aggregations as those of Kid Ory and Oscar Celestin.

At 28, Fats Domino has become one of the top artists in his field. He still makes his home in New Orleans. He is happily married and the father of six children. His five-year-old son is something of a virtuoso on the piano and drums.

His records are doing so well all over the world that the next step for Fats is a European tour. When he was asked what he thought of the idea of touring Russia as part of the United States State Department Cultural Exchange program, he replied: "If those cats like to dance, they'll dig my kind of jive."







Bobby Darin works a little like a young, zestful Sinatra, and a little like a budding Dean Martin. Yet he does not imitate either of these two great singers. He has a style all his own. And Bobby is unique in another respect. He is not only a polished performer on records and otherwise, but he is one of the most accomplished young songwriters on the current scene. He wrote his own hit, "Splish Splash". Bobby graduated from the High School of Science in New York City, and spent one year at Hunter College in New York. Long before that he was training himself for a career as an entertainer-writer. He learned to play piano, drums, guitar, vibes and bass. Bobby's mother, a lady who once graced show business herself, has been a big help to Bobby all through his early days as a performer.



The 18-year-old guitar-playing Jimmy hails from Baton Rouge, Louisiana and has two younger brothers, 14 and 17, who are also musicians. Jimmy's father is an instrument engineer at the Kaiser Aluminum plant in Baton Rouge while his mother does the household chores.







No sooner had "Fanny" begun to "fade" when Larry lifted up the shade and lo and behold, he struck gold with another queen — "Bony Moronie" was on the scene — and it's mighty nice scenery too! Here's a ditty that's pretty gone, and the Williams rendition, from dusk 'til down is from the land which the 'Jims' and 'Janes' command.

Lar' is only twenty-two, but already he's a steady teddy on the best seller charts. New Orleans, Louisiana is his home town, and the rockin' rhythms are his trademark.

The tale of the duke who's kicking up the dust was one that just started a few years ago. Touring the Oakland region of California, Larry had his own "team," and he and the boys were the answer to anybody's hit-tune theme. Twenty-one year old Jo Ann Campbell is a lass with stardust in her eyes. From the time she was a drum majorette at Fletcher high school in Jacksonville, Florida, she has always wanted to be in show business. She started right away too, traveling to Europe with a U.S.O. troupe at the tender age of sixteen, and dancing for the G.I.'s there.

Jo Ann has always had a desire to sing, and being born and brought up in the South, the music they now call rock and roll came natural to her. It was the music she was weaned on, the music that was part of her.



FABIAN





BOBBY FREEMAN

Bobby Freeman was born in Oakland, California on June 13, 1940 and at the age of 14 while attending Roosevelt Jr. High School, joined a vocal group called "The Romancers" and for a period of two years they played the local clubs in the Bay area.

Bobby then went on to Mission High School in San Francisco where he organized his own vocal group called "The Vocaliers" with Bobby singing lead. The group was highly popular with students all over the area, playing various high schools, etc.

While singing with the foursome, Bobby came to the attention of Jim Hawthorne, a disk jockey on station KYA in San Francisco at the time. Jim had Bobby make a tape of his tune, "Do You Want To Dance" and brought it to a representative of Josie Records who was in the area at the time.

The representative liked what he heard and lost no time in signing young Bobby to a recording contract — and Freeman hit the jackpot with his very first recording — "Do You Want To Dance."
