She was a new distributor, and she gave me an opportunity to become a record promoter man.

1 Q 2 company?

A Yes.

Now, the first six months were probably the hardest six months a man could ever spend, because we didn't have, you know, any labels to work on. It was very difficult to break through, and gradually we got more companies and we got more products, and we started building something out of it. It became a pretty good distributorship.

That was your first occupation with a record

- Q Were you a promoter for Buckeye?
- A Yes, I was.

It was my first job as a record promotion man.

I had never done it before. In fact, I almost quit about three times because it is a very tough field to be in.

- Q Tough in what respect?
- A Well, it -- in other words, the hours you spend. You know, it is not a nine to five job. Record promotion, you have to go in in the morning. You talk to your manufacturers. The product comes in. You listen to records, then you take the records, select whatever is right. That is what you call using your ears.

In other words, if you guess right, you are a genius; if you guess wrong, you are nothing.

I take a record to a radio station. If you believe in it, this is where the selling point comes in. There were
