John Halonka - President and owner of 50% of the stock in Alpha Distributors, distributors of records to stores and juke box operators (P. 460-461)

W first met D when latter was a disk jockey for WINS in 1954. (P. 463). At some later date W entered into an agreement with D or someone representing him with respect to the promotion or exposure of records distributed by W's concern. (P. 464)

W continued to pay D money to get his records exposed on radio station WINS (P. 464). This arrangement continued through the years 1955, 1956 and 1957. (P. 464).

After that D continued to play W's records but it was agreed that W did not have to make any more payments because W assisted D in getting ^{the better known} artists to appear on D's shows. (P. 464-465)

In 1959 W entered into an arrangement with D's secretary, who is now his wife, Inga Boling. (P. 465-466). W would bring records to D's home and Miss Boling would listen to them and pick the ones to play. Pursuant to this agreement W gave Miss Boling a check for \$500 in July 1959. (P. 466). W's purpose in making this arrangement was to get his records exposed on the air. D was then with WABC. (P. 467)

On July 1959 at D's home W entered into an arrangement with D. (P.871 II) W was to pay D \$500 a month for picking records and the payments were to be made to Angela Boling. (P.871-872 II). The reason for paying the \$500 to Miss Boling in July 1959 was for the exposure of W's records on D's radio program on WABC. (P.872 II) D suggested the amount to be paid. (P.872 II)

On August 25, 1959 W again went to D's apartment with records for him to pick and play on the radio station and W handed D a check for another \$500. (P.873 II), this payment was pursuant to the understanding that D or his representative would receive \$500 a month for exposure of W's records on D's program (P.873 II). D played the records that he had picked out of the batch. (P.874 II)

In October of 1959 W gave D another check for \$500 payable to Boling which covered the September payment. (P.876 #). This payment was also pursuant to the agreement of July 1959 for the promotion and exposure of W's records. (P.877 #)

The July, August and October checks of \$500 payable to Miss Boling are exhibit # 139, 140 and 141. (P.877 II).

D was the one who suggested that W make the checks payable to Angela Boling. (P.878 II)

The money was for the exposure of WINS records. (P.879 II). The checks were all handed to D. (P.879-880 II)

Check dated March 9, 1957 for \$2,848⁶⁵ payable to Gotham Broadcasting Corp. by down by Alpha Dist. Co. (Exhibit # 151)

Check dated March 25, 1957 made by Alpha Dist. Co. for \$1,946^{.91} payable to D (Exhibit # 236)

(P880 II) and check dated October 9, 1956 for \$3,471^{.95} payable to D made by Alpha Dist. Co. (Exhibit # 237)^(P.881 II) were given to cover the expenses incurred by

D in setting up broadcast apparatus in his home in Stamford, Conn. (P.881 II).

During the time that W was giving D these monies W brought records to D's home and these payments were in consideration for the fact that D was helping W to expose his records (P.883-884 II). As a result of the records which D played on the air for W there was, in many cases, an increase in sales. (P.885 II). W did not tell anyone at WINS that he was making these payments for D. (P.885 II.)

D state:

D's agreement with W was that D would play the records that D liked on his TV show. The checks were enclosed by D's wife Dya Boling.
