





Roll Dance Party," Volume I, to please the thousands upon thousands of the faithful cats who've been yelling for just such a reprise. And in this set Alan is joined by one of the craziest of the new rockin', rollin' groups, Jimmy Cavello and his House Rockers. To all the 'gators who jammed the theaters to see "Rock, Rock, Rock,' Jimmy needs no introduction. He and his cohorts really rock the house when they blow, and beat those drums, and Jimmy himself sings with as solid a beat as anyone about these days. Alan's own band is spotlighted in this album on eight showmanly instrumentals, including a unique version

of the 1944 oldie "Sentimental Journey," "Easy Rock," "John Thompson," "Sure," "Swell," "Stop! Look and Run," "Twenty One," and "Sometimes I'm Happy" from Broadway's hit show of 1927 "Hit the Deck."

His Majesty, the King of Rock 'n Roll, Alan Freed is back in this package, with an encore on "Rock 'n

Cavello and the House Rockers come through with swingin' vocal and instrumental jobs on "Let 'M Roll," "I'm With You," "Ooh-Wee" and "Foot Stompin'."

Rock and roll has been kicked around ever since disk jockey Alan Freed first introduced it to the pop market back in the early fifties. At various times, R. & R. has been accused of inciting everything from juvenile delinquency to unAmericanism. Something about its frantic rhythm and driving, uninhibited beat apparently infuriates stodgier members of the press and public.

When the two-beat fans first ganged up on the new rhythm, many R. & R. disk jockeys threw in their turntables. Freed, however, refused to believe that any youngster could be seduced by the sound of a saxophone. Instead, he set out to prove that rock and roll was as respectable a rhythm as any other musical tempo. Today as a result-the whole world is swinging to rock and roll beat.

Freed made his first movie, "Rock Around the Clock," in 1956, thereby marking Hollywood's first official recognition of rock and roll. The picture was a box office smash here and in Europe. He followed this with "Rock, Rock, Rock," another click. And his new Columbia film, aptly titled "Don't Knock the Rock," also a box-office hit, dramatized his fight to remove the stigma of juvenile delinquency charges from rock and roll.

Since King Alan blazed the trail for Hollywood with the three films in which he has appeared, other major Hollywood producers (such as Twentieth Century Fox with Jayne Mansfield's "The Girl Can't Help It") have climbed on the Rock 'n Roll bandwagon in a big way.

And now that he has convinced Hollywood that Rock 'n Roll is a sound, basic musical style, which is likely to remain on the American scene just as jazz and swing did, Alan is setting about achieving the same goal with network television. The American Broadcasting Company television network is presenting an Alan Freed Rock 'N Roll Show, and the probability is that more and more such shows will be seen on television screens.

And here, in this second volume of his Rock 'N Roll Dance Party, the man who was largely responsible for the introduction of rock 'n roll, the man who has been its number one champion, brings you the latest and best in big beat music. Notes by June Bundy
