




## ALAN FREED

### AND HIS ROCK 'N ROLL BAND featuring BUDDY HOLLY, BILLY WILLIAMS, THE MODERNAIRES

Just a few months ago, Alan Freed helped write a new chapter in the annals of New York's time-honored Paramount Theater.

This was the hallowed ground where great names had gone before, where names like Glenn Miller, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, Frank Sinatra, Benny Goodman, Harry James, Lionel Hampton and a host of contemporary swingers of that day had left their own indelible imprint.

It remained for Alan Freed, with a stageful of the greatest rock and rollers of our day, to break every existing record for attendance and box office receipts the theater had ever known.

Every morning, during that historical run, the lines of enthusiastic fans snaked around not one, not two, but actually three of Manhattan's busiest blocks in the heart of the Broadway theatrical district.

In memory of the great and tumultuous occasion, we bring you this, Alan Freed's third great Coral album-entitled "Rock Around the Block."

Few men can honestly claim a closer association with the Big Beat of rock and roll than disk jockey Alan Freed. In its modern usage, Alan Freed blended the term to the music, He has continually been involved in verbal slugfests over the propriety of the controversial thing called rock and roll. Seldom has he lost an argument, He has defended it and its teen-age disciples to the hilt when misguided super-conservatives, whose teen years may have fallen in the days of the goofy goldfish swallowers or crooner swooners, have attacked it.

Freed, a veteran of four rock 'n roll movies, has also been the master of ceremonies and the spirit behind a fabulously successful cross-country tour of rock and roll performers. As these shows have all proven, he's a fellow who knows his talent!

Alan Freed proves his talent-wise showmanship again with this new album. Now, you stay at home, while the king of rock and roll, with the greeting, "Hi there, everybody, this is Alan Freed," brings your own special rock and roll show right to your private phonograph.

First, you'll hear Alan's own big 16-piece rock 'n roll band - the same one that "fractured" the audiences on the big coast to coast tour, the same one that has already swung its way thru two other fine dance albums,

Then, Alan in turn introduces you to the great Texas rockabilly, Buddy Holly, who, with his group, The Crickets, has come up with a half dozen major hits in a year; the familiar, happy, foot-tapping sound of Billy Williams, long identified with TV but more recently associated with a smash version of "I'm Gonna Sit Right Down and Write Myself a Letter," and the swinging, versatile Modernaires, who step out of their own Coral album to pay you a special rock 'n roll visit here.
